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#### BURKINA FASO

**Realization of a Drilling for Zamdigo People, \$9,333**  
**Groupement Mixte of Zamdigo, Village of Zamdigo**  
 Through a bore hole drilling process, this community will have clean water closer to the village for their families use and also to facilitate the development of vegetable gardens to generate incomes and improve their quality of life.

**Bamuka Women's Meeting Hall, The Bamunka \$14,056**  
**Women's Common Initiative Group, Bamenda**  
 The women of Bamuka were in need of a meeting hall to conduct training sessions in handicraft work, cooking, and home economics. The meeting hall will also serve as a place to entertain other women groups in the region and share their thoughts and ideas. Items made will be sold through a cooperative store, in turn will improve their standard of living.

**Christian Women Fellowship Group of P.C. of \$13,210**  
**Ntenefor, Mankon-Bamenda**  
 Members of this group have organized to develop skills in

knitting, cloth making and processing of foods to generate income which in turn will help them become more self-sufficient and improve their standard of living.

**Community Farm of Mbé, Soocke po Neele \$8,110**  
**(Unity Makes Strength), Mbé/Ngaoundere**  
 A community farming project initiated to fight against hunger and poverty, it will enable the farmers to provide a better life for themselves and their families.

**Construction of Women Welfare Center, African \$11,780**  
**Women Development Foundation, Alahlie-Nkwen**  
 A welfare center will be constructed for the women of this community to conduct self-enhancement seminars and workshops, as well as receive training in sewing, needlework, cooking and agriculture.

**Food Transformation Mills, Solidarity Farming \$6,070**  
**Group, Bamenda**  
 This agricultural project consist of 18 women who will purchase food processing machines to cut down on the time and labor used to pound and grin their crop on pepper stone and eliminate the need to pay middlemen to use their machines.

## **GHANA**

### **Supply of Lagoon Fishing Boats and Nets, Anyako, \$4,520 Volta Region**

**This group of fishermen have formed a cooperative to alleviate the problems faced as individuals, such as buying supplies needed to sustain a livelihood. This project allows them to buy their own boats and supplies, which will help them develop and create jobs for themselves and others in the community.**

### **Shine Cooperative Mixed Farming and Marketing \$6,155 Society Ltd. Anloga**

**This water project will drill two wells and develop an irrigation system for farms, provide water for livestock and expand piggery by building 12 pens. With expansion of the piggery, the operation will be upgraded to modern standards and become competitive with other pig farms.**

### **Ebenezer's Co-Operative Carpenters Society Ltd. \$4,660 Anloga**

**A group of 10 men who have just completed carpenters training have organized to construct basic furniture for their local market, which will provide employment and income to improve their standard of living.**

## **KENYA**

### **Kopany Women Development Project, Homa Bay, \$22,200 Nyanza**

**This project consisting of 32 women coming together to This poultry project founded by the women of Rubaga began with 500 donated chicks and a temporary structure, which had**

**A group of 20 students from the community are learning skills necessary to work in a office setting. They will provide services for the community to generate income for themselves and train new students.**

### **Maize Growing, Kassociation of Kinyamaseke \$2,725 Women inDevelopment, Kasese**

**The women of this community have organized to learn better agricultural methods to increase yield, which enables them to sell their extra crops, therefore funding future development projects.**

### **Rubaga Women Poultry Project, Rubaga Women \$6,030 Poultry Farm, Kampala**

This group of homeless people have established a way to address their living situation and generate income by selling their handmade crafts.

Thirty women of this community have organized and developed a small dairy project for personal income, as well as nutritional needs. The milk products and manure will be sold to improve their families living standard and health.

A group of 15 widowed Dalit women and dependents have developed a project whereby they own 30 buffaloes, sell the milk, and receive suitable income for their labor. This project enables the women to take charge of their lives and provide stability for their families.

**Dalith Stone Crushing Programme, Suguna Mahila Mandali, Hyderabad \$1,760**

These part-time farm laborers have developed their own stone crushing business. With this new business they have gained new skills, increased their income, provided community employment and needed services and products.

To produce a higher quality of "silken cloth" the women of this weaving project will replace their old country looms with power looms, which will enable them to stay abreast of the market demands and increase production. With the new power looms they will become more competitive thereby enabling them to generate an income for themselves and their families.
