AFRICA

**Nten Mushroom Production Project,
Mushroom Young Farmers Group
Mekaf, Menchum NW, Cameroon** **\$13,000**

A group of young community members are working together to develop a mushroom production project that will make use of their indigenous skills, improve nutrition, protect the environment and generate income, all from a local, natural resource, the mushroom.

**Besaniya Development Association
Kampala, Uganda** **\$7,058.00**

Since the guerilla war many homes were destroyed, so there is a great need for housing and employment. This group of twenty-five people will build houses and raise crops to redevelop their own community.

**Kabule Demonstration Farm and
Sustainable Agriculture Training Programme,
Sikyomu Community Concern Group
Kabule, Uganda** **\$18,540**

Without access to land ownership, agricultural training, loans or financing, this community struggles with food shortages, lack of income, poor nutrition and poor medical care. This project provides them with the skills and knowledge to improve food production methods, soil conservation, pest and disease control and the development of new techniques to produce better breeds of crops and animals.

**Agro-Forestry and Gardening, Groupment Solim
Betlehem, TOGO (Africa)** **\$10,672**

The young men who run this seventy-five acre farm are all under the poverty level, and need this project to bring the farm to a place where it can improve their living conditions and as they write, "drive out poverty among our families."

**Babidima Group, Kinshasa,
Democratic Republic of Congo** **\$28,700**

The people involved in this project described how each day lives were lost to starvation. Through the purchase of their own vehicle, this group will be able to more effectively transport the products they grow to the market, thus increasing their profit margin and ability to feed their families.

**Group Yam Farm,
Commune Initiative Group of Yam Producers,
Adamoava, Cameroon** **\$4,564**

With oxen and equipment to cultivate the land, and a water pump to help more water reach the land, this group is now able to provide sufficient food and income for their families.

**Bee Farmers, Naki Beefarmers Club,
Wum, Cameroon** **\$9,600**

Since 1998 this group of young people have been working cooperatively as Bee Farmers. Now they want to take it to the next level by improving their skills, knowledge and production capabilities with the purchase of machinery and training.

Katekwan Farming Group, Kumi, Uganda **\$6,700**

After being devastated by a civil war and cattle rustling, this group of twenty people formed to increase crop yield by replacing an existing food staple, Cassava, with a more resistant one, Mosaic Resistant Cassava. This stronger crop will avert famine and boost the income for the participating farmers.

**Generation de L'Esperance,
Mbe, Adamaona, Cameroun** **\$5,241**

Diseases of poverty take many forms. Poor nutrition is one of them. Families in this area have decided that the best way to deal with poor nutrition, lack of daily food, books, medicine, clothing and transportation to school is to increase their income. They will achieve this by farming yams and starting an orchard.

**Calvery Mixed Farming Group,
Bamenda, Cameroon** **\$15,300**

A group of fifty-four people in this community formed a self-help cooperative to breed, raise and sell poultry to improve their living conditions and to eliminate the exploitation by aggressive middlemen.

**Maize Farming Project, Hiluka Group,
Ludema, Iringa; Tanzania** **\$6,100**

More to eat and more to sell. By purchasing oxen, plows, maize harvest and fertilizers, this group of people will now have more nutritious food for themselves and more to sell to the community.

**Ufunuo Women Development,
Shinyanga Region, Tanzania** **\$8,884**

Tanzania, like other places around the world, is plagued by the oppression of women. This group of women has decided to become more independent and self-supporting by starting a small-scale milk-processing project producing ghee (liquid butter), ghee residue (mashishanga), and skim milk.

**Kagando Disabled Women's Association,
Kagando, Uganda** **\$4,820**

Finding employment is difficult enough without having the added barrier of a disability. These disabled women will now be able to generate their own income through the purchase of a Maize Mill, which will grind corn for the community.

**Kisojo Family Support Piggery Project,
Kasese, Uganda** **\$5,295**

Thirty families, which include those who are unemployed, single mothers, internally displaced and people with low incomes, will establish a piggery to generate income, improve nutrition and foster greater community growth involvement.

**ATEK Development Association,
Soroti, Eastern Uganda** **\$4,856**

There is often a shortage of food for this community, so thirty-nine families have decided to purchase sixteen oxen, eight heifers, and related equipment and training in order to cultivate and improve their land's yield.

**Good Hope Brothers Alamatu-Mankon
Bamenda, North West Province, Cameroon** **\$7,085**

Having a central area for the daily feeding, watering, and sanitation of pigs is very important to this community as they seek to increase production, and eliminate hunger and poverty.

**Ngandu Women's Poultry project,
Mukdno, Uganda** **\$9,450**

Exotic egg-laying chickens, sunflowers and maize for feed will enable this group of women to fight the diseases of poverty by improving their own and their family's overall diet.

Bakery & Fast Food Project, \$25,000
Women's Development Organization
Dakar, Senegal

Twelve women have decided to break the cycle of dependence by designing a self-sustaining cooperative. They will open two bakeries and fast-food restaurants in two villages and use fresh products from local farmers. This will increase their quality of life, that of their children, and of the farmers and their families.

LATIN AMERICA

Solar Irrigation Project, \$22,380
KOPA Kolade (Cooperative Kolade)
Port-au-Prince, Haiti

By installing a solar-powered irrigation system, this group of farmers will be able to pipe water to their crops, develop wells of clean drinking water, and raise several crops which have been difficult or impossible up to this point.

Construcciones Ecologicas Lopez SC de RL, \$27,525
Ciudad Obregon, Sonora, Mexico

This community, using local and natural resources, such as mud, straw, reeds, bamboo and the like, will now be able to build more affordable and comfortable homes with the equipment they are able to purchase.

Workers Rights and Union Democracy, \$19,000
Reynosa, Mexico

Through the formation of this group, workers in this community will be able to realize and protect their rights in areas of compensation, the use of hazardous products, racism, sexual harassment and other injustices.

Women of the Community, \$9,710.00
Tamaulipas, Mexico

Widows and single mothers who are unemployed or earn low wages have decided to increase not only their standard of living, but also their self-esteem by developing handcrafts and clothing for sale in their community.

Colonia Cinco de Mayo, \$16,400
Noglaes, Mexico

A group of eleven single mothers and fathers are working together to begin a sewing factory that will make use of their skills so they can improve their living standards.

Hermanamiento San Luis Mo. Rio Abajo, \$14,407
San Juan de Limay, Nicaragua

Water is critical to life. But, clean water is even more important. With this project, individual families will be able to have clean, running water in their homes, grow vegetable gardens, raise poultry and do other activities, which will promote improved nutrition.

Job Creation Project, "Tortillas La Unica," \$3,109
Women's Union of Ococa (Grupo UMO),
San Jose, Costa Rica

This group of women is responding to the economic crisis in their community by creating locally paid jobs through the production and sale of tortillas. The project serves as an example to other women who want to organize in the same way.

Community San Luis, \$20,000
Cumunidad Aguacayo, El Salvador

This community had to buy water from the municipality, which is two kilometers from the community. By building a well with an electronic pump, more than fifty-seven families will experience improved health, nourishment and a huge savings in transportation expenses.

**Luchando Por La Vida,
Trujillo, Colon, Honduras** **\$13,400**

Imagine improving the health of an entire village of 10,000 people while also generating income for members of that same village. This group of nine women will now be able to produce Mosquito Nets, which will not only dramatically reduce the number of Malaria cases but also increase employment opportunities.

ASIA

**Garment Making and Marketing,
Self-Development of People Committee
Prakasam District, India** **\$10, 110**

This fifty-member group has started a garment-making training/production center that will increase their ability to earn income and improve nutrition and healthcare in their community.

**Buffalo Raising, Chaithany Women's Group
Podili, Andhra Pradesh, India** **\$5,413**

A group of widows, living in an oppressive society, formed a self-help group to raise buffaloes for milk and dung sales to neighbors and nearby communities.

**Rajeswari Yuvathi Mahila Mandali,
Pulivendula, India** **\$1,900**

Regular employment, a decent status in society and social change are now within the reach of this group of twenty women who will purchase machinery and raw materials to produce "ready-made" garments.

**Tamarind Processing, Puthuyugam Women's Group,
Pachal, Tamil Nadu, India** **\$6,000**

Providing employment opportunities for destitute women is just one of the goals of this project. Through the creation of a Tamarind Processing Plant, this group of fifteen women will now be able to overcome dehumanization and gain the respect they deserve in their community.

**Manufacturing of Traditional Lambadi Dresses and
Toys, Nomadic Tribal Women's Group
(The Indigenous People), Chengam Taluk, India** **\$6,075**

In order to generate income and sustain the cultural tradition of Lambadi, this community group will make and sell hand-made traditional Lambadi-Pattiy-Kali (lime petticoat skirts) and toys.

**Varalakshmi Group of fishermen of Pallepalsm,
Village, Varalakshmi Fishermen Group,
Kothapatnam A.P. India** **\$16,562**

Through the purchase of motors, boats and better nets, this group of fishermen will be able to dramatically increase their productivity and safety, while decreasing costs when fishing.

**Vietnam Dried Fish Production Project,
Thien-Thien Phu (God's Giving), Ho Chi Minh, Vietnam** **\$10,000**

A group of twenty-nine people from poor families have joined together to produce dried, instant food such as squid, shrimp and spring rolls to sell in local stores. This cooperative venture will generate employment for an entire community where previously, there was very little.

DOMESTIC PROJECTS 2003

MIDWEST

**Lagrange Village Council (LVC),
Toledo, Ohio** **\$10,000**

Like many other neighborhoods, the Lagrange community faces the challenge of self-addressing crime and unsafe living conditions. They have established a non-confrontational, trained Community Citizen's Patrol (CCP) to monitor and report crime activity in their neighborhood.

**Alliance for African Assistance Minnesota,
Moorhead, Minnesota** **\$10,000**

By forming an alliance, this group of African refugees plan to challenge discrimination, unemployment, poverty and poor housing conditions through education, and economic development activities.

**Committee for the Preservation of
Immigrant Families,
Minneapolis/St. Paul Minnesota** **\$10,000**

Low self-esteem and low self-confidence are just two of the many effects of having no voice and no power in a society. This Latino community has decided to develop leadership skills through training in areas of team building, effective meeting management, and advocacy. It is through this training that the group gains their voice and greater level of self-dignity.

**ECOVIDA,
Chicago, IL** **\$30,000**

This urban farming program provides educational experiences for both the youth and older residents by developing leadership capacity, providing viable alternatives for economic self-sufficiency and create social consciousness regarding the causes of environmental deterioration and its impact on society.

**Anishinaabe Center,
Detroit Lakes, Minnesota** **\$10,000**

Without the proper knowledge and skills, defending ones self can extremely difficult. Through advocacy skill training, the Anishinaabe people can now speak up for themselves in the face of federal, state and reservation governmental oppression.

**Purchase and Operate A Duplex,
Centro Campesino, Inc.,
Owatonna, Minnesota** **\$20,000**

Migrant agricultural workers in the Owatonna area are subject to prejudice and discrimination. They are very concerned that if they press civil and human rights issues too strongly, they will be evicted from their rented space. By owning their own space, they can become more aggressive without risking eviction.

**Si Se Puede,
Omaha, Nebraska** **\$20,000**

More than 150 workers from different meat packing plants in the area organized to create more humane working conditions and decent wages. Work related injuries, health problems and miscarriages are a few of the conditions this group will address.

**Positive Enhancement of People:
Eastwood Resident Association,
Ames, Iowa** **\$25,000**

This community is a HUD housing development for low-income people. They are isolated from the Ames community and even from each other within the four buildings of the housing development. There is no public transportation in the area. Through planning, training, community activities and a "Wheels to Work" program this community can now proactively address the issue of isolation.

**San Lucas Workers Center,
Chicago, IL**

\$45,720

The San Lucas Workers Center is organizing to force day labor agencies, where its members work, to comply with a Code of Conduct that will end abuse of workers rights, such as discrimination, illegal fees, unsafe transportation and unsafe conditions. They wish to target client companies and ask that the companies only contract with agencies that comply with this code.

**Fellowship of Filipino Migrants in Chicago,
Chicago, IL**

\$30,000

A group of immigrants from the Philippines, who now reside in Chicago face constant issues of deportation, un- or under-employment, lack of clothing, food and poor health. This support group will develop strategies to address all of these problems.

**The Enterprise People, Inc.,
Madison, WI**

\$29,440

The project is a training and support group for members of the community who want to establish their own small businesses. The group works cooperatively by assisting one another in business plan writing and critiquing, sharing office space and bookkeeping services and other essential business services.

**Alpha & Omega Transportation,
Duluth, MN**

\$14,000

Alpha & Omega Transportation is a clean, convenient and economical transportation service linking the Duluth Superior International Airport with local hotels and motels throughout the twin ports vicinity. This service is completely operated and cooperatively owned by welfare-to-work recipients and low-income men and women.

NORTHEAST

**FUREE (Families United for Racial and
Economic Equality), Access to Training and Education,
Brooklyn, N.Y.**

\$20,000

Seeking to change a welfare system that does not equitably provide training or work opportunities is difficult. However, this group of women intends to accomplish this by ensuring that the welfare bureaucracy enacts the recently passed Access to Training and Education Law in New York City.

**Wabanaki Arts Center, Maine Indian
Basketmakers Alliance,
Old Town, ME**

\$25,000

Indians whose livelihood is making baskets are living on the edge of poverty. There is little incentive for younger Indians to learn the craft and so the art form has been dying out. The Wabanaki Arts Center will provide a year round market for the sale of Indian baskets which will help the basketmakers make a living wage and encourage more young people to learn the craft from their elders.

**Seeking Police Protection and Revitalization
Bridgeport ACORN East side,
Bridgeport, CT**

\$35,000

The people living on the East Side and East End of Bridgeport have come together to address the issue of security. Children had to walk home from school past open drug deals. With increased police protection and neighborhood involvement this will no longer be the case.

Rhode Island ACORN, Providence, Neighborhood Organizing Project, Providence, RI **\$20,000**

These 700 low and moderate income families will focus on developing leadership, organization-building and targeted campaigns designed to address utility company accountability issues, predatory lending, fair housing, rat infestation, and lack of city services.

Spirit of The Law Self-Help Clinic, Strengthen Our Sisters, Inc., Hewitt, New Jersey **\$35,000**

Many members of this group suffer from Battered Woman's Syndrome, which often leaves them in a vulnerable state both emotionally and spiritually. This project will empower them to obtain legal support and guidance in court procedures.

Cooperative Action Program of Southern McDowell County (CAPS), Panther, West Virginia **\$35,000**

In this underdeveloped and under-served area, the residents have decided to take matters into their own hands by providing themselves with general education, computer literacy, and leadership classes. They will also address substandard living conditions by actually doing home repairs.

Cost of Care Campaign, Day Care Justice Co-op, Inc., Providence, Rhode Island **\$15,000**

Through the Cost of Care Campaign, the Day Care Justice Co-op seeks to recruit new members, lobby legislators and candidates for governor, negotiate with the Department of Human Services for a fair and equitable contract in providing child care, and educate the public about the situation of child care providers and quality of care issues.

South Asian Support Center, Philadelphia, PA **\$25,000**

Facing cultural differences, language barriers and lack of job skills, the members of this group seek to develop self-sufficiency through job training, language development and other related services.

Community Day Center of Walham, Waltham, MA **\$20,000**

The forty to sixty homeless participants in this project have organized to provide themselves with a supportive environment where they can have access to a phone, fax, e-mail, and street address. The project includes having a place to meet with advocates and strategize as to how to impact their local political system in areas regarding homelessness.

SOUTH

Bay Area Women Coalition, Inc., Trinity Gardens of Mobile/Pritchard, AL **\$25,000**

This organization was formed to focus on job development, job training, and educational awareness of the citizens in the area. Working with government agencies and community organizations, the group has developed a comprehensive strategy toward accomplishing its goals.

Eastside Concerned Citizens, Inc., Savannah, GA **\$26,000**

Eastside Concerned Citizens, Inc., located in the economically depressed community on the east side of Savannah, is taking the initiative to address several areas of major concern. They are: a high rate of health deficiencies, unemployment, lack of medical benefits, dilapidated housing, truancy, crime and low educational achievement levels.

Farmers Cooperative & Community Development Association, Greeleyville, SC **\$20,000**

A group of 25 low-income, African American small farmers have started a cooperative greenhouse business. The group will share equipment, and will receive training and the general support needed to be successful.

Concerned Citizens of Tillery, Tillery, NC **\$30,000**

African American residents of an underdeveloped part of rural northeastern North Carolina who are largely descendants of participants in a New Deal resettlement program of the 1930's have organized to focus on racial justice, community-based economic development, political participation and community-based health care.

Between Ages Community Organization, Hollister, NC **\$33,468**

Residents of the Hollister community between the ages of 55 and 80 began the Between Ages Community Organization as a health focus group with only five participants. They have grown to a lively group of 50, with more than 35 seniors participating regularly in physical fitness and social enrichment activities.

Bandy Community Center, Bandy, VA **\$10,000**

The Bandy Community Center is the hub of community activities and essential services. The county and state government either can not or will not provide the services needed by this center, so they have had to do it themselves. To operate, the center needed a new HVAC system, which was made possible by this grant.

Ex-Offenders Project, Eternal Life Restoration Outreach, Knoxville, TN **\$10,000**

Many ex-offenders have virtually no support system when they are released. They receive anywhere from \$25-\$100 upon release and often times family and former support systems are no longer available. This project provides a mental, physical, spiritual and social system for empowerment and support.

The Organization of Mayan People, Inc., Lake Worth, FL **\$15,600**

There are 25,000 Mayan People in South Florida representing over 22 language groups. They have not been able to organize and gain attention for their needs because they cannot communicate to organize. This project removes these barriers by creating a communication clearinghouse no matter which language they speak.

Asian Senior Center, Immigrant and Refugee Asian Seniors, Miami, FL **\$15,000**

A group of poor, senior South Asian Immigrants/Refugees have come together to address the problem of isolation. Now that they have transportation, they can gain English skills and begin a micro-enterprise helping them gain greater self-sufficiency.

Flint River Farmers' Cooperative, Newton, GA **\$11,000**

Several African-American farmers, who operate single family farms, have formed a cooperative effort to create and expand a market for their crops. This project will create a sustainable market where none currently exists. Through the purchase of key equipment they will be able to facilitate long-term change.

**True Light Transportation,
Prayer Warriors of Houston,
Warner Robins, GA** **\$15,000**

There is no public transportation in the Centerville and Warner Robins area. The only form of transportation available is a taxi, which can become quite expensive. This group has come together to put a van in operation that will serve their own needs and those of other low income and poor people in their community.

**Lake Apopka Health Project,
Apopka, FL** **\$10,000**

Very poor farm workers in the rural Apopka area, exposed to very high levels of organochlorine pesticides over a long period of time, are now experiencing very serious health problems. This project seeks to research health issues, document the relationship between health problems and exposure to the pesticides, and finally, seek access to appropriate health care.

WEST

**Lao Iu Mien Cultural Association, Inc.,
Oakland, CA** **\$25,000**

About 5,000 Iu Mien, an ethnic group from Laos, live in the low-income area of southern Oakland. The older generation does not speak English and without a place to congregate, they find themselves isolated in their homes. This project provides a cultural center where they can engage in culturally relevant activities, and pass the activities on to the youth.

**“Save Our Section” Project (SOS 8),
Utah HUD Tenants Association,
Salt Lake City, UT** **\$19,500**

By combining their efforts, this community will now be able to strengthen their networks, address employment issues and improve living conditions in the housing units.

**Low Income Self Help Center,
San Jose, CA** **\$15,000**

Many of the people in this group are disabled or have health problems. Some are uninsured or underinsured. This center is their voice, their way of advocating for their needs. It also allows access to phones, computers and fax machines, something many of them do not have.

**Ksanka Language Commission,
Elmo, Montana** **\$30,000**

Out of 6,000 Native Americans who live on this reservation, only 25 are fluent in the Ksanka language. The purpose of this project is to revive the language so that it can be restored and taught to the current and new generation.

**Eagle Wing Recovery Services, Inc.,
Hoopa, CA** **\$20,000**

By forming a cohesive group with the proper funding, this group will now be able to gain recognition by federal, tribal and local government entities as a formal non-profit organization. This will allow its members to more effectively promote health and wellness through both conventional health methods and culturally relevant ceremonies.

**Klamath-Trinity Non-emergency Transportation,
Willow Creek, CA** **\$30,000**

Willow Creek and the other eight communities involved in this project are located in a very remote area of Northern California and do not have public transportation of any kind. This project will link these communities to the county bus services, thereby providing greater access to essential services.

**Comunidad en Progreso,
Albuquerque, NM** **\$20,000**

A group of 15 women who want to overcome poverty have come together to form a sewing cooperative. Having just completed three months of training, the women are now ready to make school uniforms for the local school district as a way to develop sustainable income.

**Humboldt Handmade Artisans & Crafters Guild,
Areata, CA** **\$20,000**

As a cooperative, this group of artisans and crafters will now be able to share the expense of common purchases, meet regularly to network, and share equipment and other resources.

**Los Angeles Community Action Network,
Los Angeles, CA** **\$20,000**

This grassroots, community-based network is made up of homeless and formerly homeless people who advocate on behalf of themselves and people like them. They specifically address encounters with District security officers, private security, LAPD officers, homeless service providers and others.

**SOS 8 Colorado (Save Our Section 8 of Colorado),
Denver, CO** **\$18,000**

To save their housing complexes, this group of disabled seniors and families on fixed incomes has organized, creating a greater voice and therefore, a more powerful force for action.

**Eco Care Profession Housecleaning,
Morgan Hill, CA** **\$20,000**

Eco Care Professional Housecleaning is a women's cooperative comprised of immigrant Hispanic women who are dedicated to using ecologically sound cleaning methods.
